#### 1.3.1 **Product highlights**

#### Latest processor technology



The motherboard supports the latest Intel® Pentium™ 4 processor via a 478-pin surface mount ZIF socket. The processor with 1 MB/512 KB L2 cache includes a 800/533/400 MHz system bus and features the Intel Hyper-Threading Technology and new power design that allow up to 3.4+ GHz core frequencies The motherboard fully supports the new generation 90 nm Pentium® 4 processor.

#### Dual-channel DDR400 memory support



Employing the dual-channel DDR memory architecture, the motherboard provides a solution that doubles the system memory bandwidth to boost system performance. The motherboard supports up to 4 GB of system memory using PC3200/2700/2100 ECC or non-ECC DDR DIMMs to deliver up to 6.4 GB/s data transfer rate for various server applications.

## Serial ATA technology



The motherboard supports the new Serial ATA technology through the SATA interfaces and the Intel® 6300ESB. The SATA specification allows for thinner, more flexible cables with lower pin count, reduced voltage requirement, and up to 150 MB/s data transfer rate. For Serial ATA models, the Adaptec® AIC-8110X chip supports four additional SATA connectors to give you six fully-compatible SATA interfaces. For IDE models, the Intel® 6300ESB ICH provides RAID 0 and RAID 1 solution for two Serial ATA interfaces using the Windows® XP operating system.

## Zero Channel RAID (ZCR) solution (optional on SATA and SCSI models only)

The motherboard supports the optional Zero Channel RAID card in SODIMM package for a multi-RAID solution using Serial ATA150 hard disk drives or Ultra320 SCSI hard disk drives. The RAID 0 (striping), RAID 1 (mirroring), RAID 0+1, and RAID 5 provide a cost-effective, reliable and high-performance server system.

#### Single-channel Ultra320 SCSI support (on SCSI models only)

The Adaptec® AIC-7901X Ultra320 SCSI controller and single-channel SCSI connector are onboard to provide high-speed data transfers to and from SCSI hard disk drives.

The Intel® 82541GI and Intel® 82547GI Gigabit Ethernet controller allows full-duplex Gigabit performance on LAN on Motherboard (LOM) applications. Take the advantage of the Communication Streaming Architecture (CSA) with the Intel® 82547GI controller that connects to the dedicated CSA bus on the Memory Controller Hub (MCH). This reduces the PCI bottlenecks by freeing the PCI bus for other I/O operations. The Intel® 82541GI controller utilizes the PCI interface on the Southbridge to provide a faster and more efficient networking performance.

## Server management

With the onboard Baseboard Management Connector (BMC) for the ASUS server management card, managing your server motherboard has never been this easy. ASUS server management cards fully conform to the IPMI1.5 or 2.0 versions.

# **Chapter summary**

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## 2.1 Before you proceed


Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



- 1. Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- 2. Use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or to a metal object, such as the power supply case, before handling components to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- 3. Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- 4. Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, and/or components.

#### **Power LED**

The motherboard has a green power LED (**SB\_PWR1**). When lit, this LED indicates that the system is ON, in sleep mode, or in soft-off mode, a reminder that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component.



## 2.2 Motherboard installation

Before you install the motherboard, study the configuration of your chassis to ensure that the motherboard fits into it.



Make sure to unplug the power cord before installing or removing the motherboard. Failure to do so may cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components.

## 2.2.1 Placement direction

When installing the motherboard, make sure that you place it to the chassis in the correct orientation. The edge with external ports goes to the rear part of the chassis as indicated in the image below.

## 2.2.2 Screw holes

Secure the motherboard to the chassis with nine (9) screws on the holes indicated by the circles.




Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so may damage the motherboard.







## 2.3 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

## 2.3.1 Overview

The motherboard comes with a surface mount 478-pin Zero Insertion Force (ZIF) socket. The socket is designed for the Intel® Pentium™ 4 processor in the 478-pin package with 1 MB/512 KB L2 cache.


Take note of the marked corner (with gold triangle) on the CPU. This mark should match a specific corner of the CPU socket.



## 2.3.2 Installing the CPU

Follow these steps to install a CPU.


1. Locate the 478-pin ZIF socket on the motherboard.




2. Unlock the socket by pressing the lever sideways, then lift it up to a 90°-100° angle.



Make sure that the socket lever is lifted up to 90°-100° angle; otherwise, the CPU does not fit in completely.




- Position the CPU above the socket such that its marked corner matches the base of the socket lever.
- 4. Carefully insert the CPU into the socket until it fits in place.





The CPU fits only in one correct orientation. DO NOT force the CPU into the socket to prevent bending the pins and damaging the CPU!

 When the CPU is in place, push down the socket lever to secure the CPU. The lever clicks on the side tab to indicate that it is locked.





After installation, make sure to plug-in the 4-pin ATX power cable to the motherboard.

# 2.3.3 Installing the optional CPU heatsink and thermal plate




The passive CPU heatsink and a thermal plate is purchased separately. For optimum thermal solution, use the recommended CPU heatsink and thermal plate.

#### **CPU** thermal plate


This motherboard requires a thermal plate for the CPU. Place the thermal plate underneath the motherboard before you install the heatsink.

Refer to the picture below for the correct matching of the motherboard and thermal plate holes.




To install the CPU heatsink:


1. Carefully place the heatsink on top of the installed CPU.



2. Hold down the heatsink lightly and twist each of the four screws with a Philips (cross) screwdriver just enough to attach the heatsink to the motherboard.



3. When the four screws are attached, tighten them one by one to completely secure the heatsink.






Do not overtighten the screws to avoid damaging the motherboard.

#### 2.4 **System memory**

#### **Overview** 2.4.1

The motherboard comes with four Double Data Rate (DDR) Dual Inline Memory Module (DIMM) sockets.

The following figure illustrates the location of the sockets.

#### **Memory configurations** 2.4.2

You may install 64 MB, 128 MB, 256 MB, 512 MB, and 1GB DDR DIMMs into the DIMM sockets using the memory configurations in this section.

## Important notes on memory configurations



- Installing DDR DIMMs other than the recommended configurations may cause memory sizing error or system boot failure. Use any of the recommended configurations in Table 1.
- Use the blue DIMM slots first.
- In Dual-channel configurations, install only identical (the same type and size) DDR DIMM pairs for each channel.
- Always install DIMMs with the same CAS latency, otherwise, the system may run in a lower frequency. For optimum compatibility, it is recommended that you obtain memory modules from the same vendor.
- When all four sockets are populated with 1 GB DIMMs (total 4 GB), the system may detect only 3583 MB due to the Southbridge resource allocation.
- Three DDR DIMMs installed into any three memory sockets will function in single channel mode.
- Make sure that the memory frequency matches the CPU FSB. Refer to Table 2 for configurations.

## 2.4.3 Installing a DIMM



Make sure to unplug the power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or other system components. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to both the motherboard and the components.


Follow these steps to install a DIMM.


- Unlock a DIMM socket by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Align a DIMM on the socket such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the socket.



A DDR DIMM is keyed with a notch so that it fits in only one direction. DO NOT force a DIMM into a socket to avoid damaging the DIMM.

Firmly insert the DIMM into the socket until the retaining clips snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.





## 2.4.4 Removing a DIMM


Follow these steps to remove a DIMM.

 Simultaneously press the retaining clips outward to unlock the DIMM.



Support the DIMM lightly with your fingers when pressing the retaining clips. The DIMM might get damaged when it flips out with extra force.

2. Remove the DIMM from the socket.



## 2.5 Expansion slots

In the future, you may need to install expansion cards. The motherboard has one 64-bit PCI-X slot and two 32-bit PCI slots. The following sub-sections describe the slots and the expansion cards that they support.



Make sure to unplug the power cord before adding or removing expansion cards. Failure to do so may cause you physical injury and damage motherboard components.

## 2.5.1 Installing an expansion card

Follow these steps to install an expansion card.

- 1. Before installing the expansion card, read the documentation that came with it and make the necessary hardware settings for the card.
- 2. Remove the system unit cover (if your motherboard is already installed in a chassis).
- 3. Remove the bracket opposite the slot that you intend to use. Keep the screw for later use.
- 4. Align the card connector with the slot and press firmly until the card is completely seated on the slot.
- 5. Secure the card to the chassis with the screw you removed earlier.
- 6. Replace the system cover.

## 2.5.2 Configuring an expansion card

After installing the expansion card, configure it by adjusting the software settings.

- 1. Turn on the system and change the necessary BIOS settings, if any. See Chapter 4 for information on BIOS setup.
- 2. Assign an IRQ to the card. Refer to the tables on the next page.
- 3. Install the software drivers for the expansion card.

When using PCI cards on shared slots, ensure that the drivers support "Share IRQ" or that the cards do not need IRQ assignments.

Otherwise, conflicts will arise between the two PCI groups, making the system unstable and the card inoperable.

## 2.5.3 PCI slots

The PCI slots support PCI cards such as a LAN card, SCSI card, USB card, and other cards that comply with PCI specifications.






When installing long PCI cards, it is recommended that you install them in the PCIX1 and PCI3 slots. Long PCI cards installed in the PCI2 slot may interfere with the SATA connectors.

## 2.6 Jumpers

#### 1. Keyboard power (3-pin KBPWR1)


This jumper allows you to enable or disable the keyboard wake-up feature. Set this jumper to pins 2-3 (+5VSB) if you wish to wake up the computer when you press a key on the keyboard. This feature requires an ATX power supply that can supply at least 1A on the +5VSB lead, and a corresponding setting in the BIOS. Refer to Chapter 4 for more information.

#### 2. Integrated LAN controllers (3-pin LAN\_EN1; LAN\_EN2)


This jumper allows you enable or disable the onboard LAN controllers. The LAN\_EN1 jumper is for the LAN1 port controlled by the Intel® 82547GI LAN controller while the LAN\_EN2 jumper is for the LAN2 port controlled by the Intel® 82541GI LAN controller.



**PSCH-SR LAN Controller Jumper** 


#### 3. Integrated graphics controller (3-pin VGA\_EN1)

This jumper allows you enable or disable the onboard graphics controller.



## 4. SATA/SCSI controller jumper (3-pin SASI\_EN1)

This jumper allows you enable or disable the SATA controller (on SATA models) or the SCSI controller (on SCSI models).




#### 5. Clear RTC RAM (3-pin CLRTC1)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. The RAM data in CMOS, that include system setup information such as system date, time, and system setup parameters, and passwords, is powered by the onboard button cell battery.

To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Remove the onboard battery.
- 3. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 4. Re-install the battery.
- 5. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 6. Hold down the <Del> key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to re-enter data.




**PSCH-SR Clear RTC RAM**

#### 6. Force BIOS recovery (3-pin J5)

This jumper allows you to update or recover the BIOS settings when it gets corrupted or destroyed.



**PSCH-SR Force BIOS Recovery Setting** 


This jumper allows you to update/recover the BIOS quickly.

To update the BIOS:

- 1. Prepare a floppy disk that contains the latest BIOS for the motherboard (xxxx-xxx.BIN) and the AWDFLASH.EXE utility.
- 2. Set the jumper to pins 2-3.
- 3. Insert the floppy disk, then turn on the system to update the BIOS.
- 4. Shut down the system.
- 5. Set the jumper back to pins 1-2.
- 6. Turn on the system.


### 7. Hard disk drive/SCSI LED switch (4-pin J4)

This jumper allows you to enable or disable the front panel hard disk drive or SCSI LED. The HD/SCSI LED is enabled when no jumper cap is placed over the pins.



### 8. DDR voltage regulator (3-pin J6)

This jumper allows you adjust the DDR voltage to +5% or -5%. The DDR voltage is at its normal level when no jumper cap is placed over the pins.




**PSCH-SR DDR Voltage Switching Regulator**


### 9. Serial ROM initialization jumper (3-pin J2) SATA models only.

This jumper allows you to enable or disable the serial ROM for Serial ATA devices.



### 2.7 Connectors

### 2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. PS/2 mouse port. This green 6-pin connector is for a PS/2 mouse.
- 2. LAN1 port. This port allows Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. This port is controlled by the Intel® 82547GI LAN controller. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.
- 3. RJ-45 port. This port allows Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. This port is controlled by the Intel® 82541GI LAN controller. Refer to the table below for the RJ-45 port LED indications. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.



- **4. VGA port.** This port connects a VGA display device.
- **5. Serial port.** This 9-pin COM1 port is for pointing devices or other serial devices.
- **6. USB 2.0 ports 1 and 2.** These 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0 devices.
- 7. PS/2 keyboard port. This purple connector is for a PS/2 keyboard.

### 2.7.2 Internal connectors

### 1. Power supply unit SMBus connector (5-pin PSUSMB1)

This connector allows you to connect SMBus (System Management Bus) devices to the power supply unit. Devices communicate with an SMBus host and/or other SMBus devices using the SMBus interface.




**PSCH-SR Power Supply SMBus Header**

### 2. Front panel SMBus connector (6-1 pin FPSMB1 [white])


This connector allows you to connect SMBus (System Management Bus) devices to system front panel components. Devices communicate with an SMBus host and/or other SMBus devices using the SMBus interface.

#### 3. Backplane SMBus connector (6-1 pin BPSMB1 [black])

This connector allows you to connect SMBus (System Management Bus) devices to system backplane components such as SATA or SCSI backplanes. Devices communicate with an SMBus host and/or other SMBus devices using the SMBus interface.




**PSCH-SR Backplane SMBus Header** 

#### 4. Chassis intrusion connector (4-1 pin CHASSIS1)

This lead is for a chassis designed with intrusion detection feature. This requires an external detection mechanism such as a chassis intrusion sensor or microswitch. When you remove any chassis component, the sensor triggers and sends a high-level signal to this lead to record a chassis intrusion event.

By default, the pins labeled "Chassis Signal" and "Ground" are shorted with a jumper cap. If you wish to use the chassis intrusion detection feature, remove the jumper cap from the pins.




**PSCH-SR Chassis Intrusion Connector** 

#### 5. IDE connectors (40-1 pin PRI\_IDE1 [blue], SEC\_IDE1 [black)

This connector supports the provided UltraATA100 IDE hard disk ribbon cable. Connect the cable's blue connector to the primary (recommended) or secondary IDE connector, then connect the gray connector to the UltraATA100 slave device and the black connector to the UltraATA100 master device. It is recommended that you connect non-UltraATA100 devices to the secondary IDE connector. If you install two hard disks, you must configure the second drive as a slave device by setting its jumper accordingly. Refer to the hard disk documentation for the jumper settings. BIOS supports specific device bootup. You may configure two hard disks to be both master devices with two ribbon cables – one for the primary IDE connector and another for the secondary IDE connector.




- Pin 20 on each IDE connector is removed to match the covered hole on the UltraATA cable connector. This prevents incorrect orientation when you connect the cables.
- The hole near the blue connector on the UltraATA100 cable is intentional.
- For UltraATA IDE devices, use the 80-conductor IDE cable.



#### 6. Serial ATA connectors (7-pin SATA1, SATA2)

These next generation connectors support the thin Serial ATA cables for Serial ATA hard disks. The current Serial ATA interface allows up to 150MB/s data transfer rate, faster than the standard parallel ATA with 133MB/s (Ultra ATA/133).

If you installed Serial ATA hard disk drives and Windows® XP operating system, you can create a RAID 0 or RAID 1 configuration using the Adaptec HostRAID technology embedded in the Intel® 6300ESB.





#### Important notes on Serial ATA


- In a legacy operating system (DOS) environment, using the Serial ATA connectors will disable the Southbridge support to one of the IDE channels (either primary or secondary channel).
- The Serial ATA RAID feature (RAID 0 and RAID 1) is only available under Windows® XP.

## 7. Serial ATA RAID connectors (7-pin SATA\_RAID1, SATA\_RAID2, SATA\_RAID3, SATA\_RAID4)



The Serial ATA RAID connectors are available on SATA models only.

These Serial ATA connectors support SATA hard disks that you can configure as a RAID set. Through the onboard Adaptec® AIC-8110X RAID controller, you may create a RAID0, RAID1, RAID0+1, or multi-RAID configuration.






- If you wish to create a RAID set, make sure that you have connected the SATA cable and installed Serial ATA hard disk drives. You cannot enter the SATARaid<sup>™</sup> utility and SATA BIOS setup during POST if there are no connected Serial ATA HDDs.
- The Adaptec® AIC-8110X RAID controller does not support ATAPI devices such as CD-ROMs, DVD-ROMs, etc.

### 8. LAN LED connector (4-pin LAN\_LED1)

This connector is for the LAN activity LEDs in the system front panel.




#### 9. ATX power connectors (20-pin ATXPWR1, 4-pin ATX12V1)

These connectors connect to an ATX 12 V power supply. The plugs from the power supply are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.

In addition to the 20-pin ATXPWR1 connector, connect the 4-pin ATX +12V power plug to provide sufficient power to the CPU.




- 1. Do not forget to connect the 4-pin ATX +12V power plug. Otherwise, the system does not boot up.
- 2. Make sure that your ATX 12 V power supply can provide 8A on the +12V lead and at least 1A on the +5-volt standby lead (+5VSB). The minimum recommended wattage is 300W. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.

#### 10. Floppy disk drive connector (34-1 pin FLOPPY1)

This connector supports the provided floppy drive ribbon cable. After connecting one end to the motherboard, connect the other end to the floppy disk drive. (Pin 5 is removed to prevent incorrect insertion when using FDD cables with a closed pin 5 hole).




**PSCH-SR Floppy Disk Drive Connector** 

### 11. Ultra320 SCSI connector (68-pin SCSIA1)



The Ultra320 SCSI connector is available on SCSI models only.

This single channel Ultra320 SCSI connector supports SCSI hard disk drives that you may configure as a RAID set through the onboard Adaptec® 7901 SCSI controller. The channel can support a maximum of 15 devices as specified by Ultra320 SCSI standards.






If you wish to create a SCSI RAID set, make sure that you have connected the SCSI cable and installed SCSI devices.

### 12. Locator connector (6-pin LOCATOR)


This connector controls the locator LEDs in the system front or rear panel. By default, this connector comes without a jumper.



## 13. CPU, Front, and Rear fan connectors (3-pin CPU\_FAN1/2, FRONT\_FAN1/2, REAR\_FAN1/2)

The fan connectors on this motherboard support various server configurations. Use the rear fan connectors if you intend to install the motherboard in a tower/pedestal chassis. Use the front fan connectors when using a rackmount configuration.

The fan connectors support cooling fans of 350 mA  $\sim$  740 mA (8.88 W max.) or a total of 1 A  $\sim$  2.22 A (26.64 W max.) at +12 V. Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, making sure that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.






Do not forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Lack of sufficient air flow within the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! DO NOT place jumper caps on the fan connectors!

### 14. Serial connector (10-1 pin COM2 for management use)

This connector accommodates a server management card using the serial interface.






Since this connector is dedicated for server management, you must use a null modem cable to make the connector operational.

#### 15. System panel connector (20-1 pin PANEL)

This connector accommodates several system front panel functions.

#### System Power LED (3-pin PLED)

This connector is for the system power LED. The LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

### Message LED (2-pin MLED)

This connector is for the front panel message LED that indicates the booting status. The LED blinks when the system is in the boot process until the operating system is loaded.

### System Warning Speaker (4-pin SPKR)

This connector is for the case-mounted speaker and allows you to hear system beeps and warnings.

### • Hard Disk Activity (2-pin HD\_LED)

This connects to the hard disk drive LED. The read or write activities of the hard disk drive connected to the any of IDE connectors cause the hard disk drive LED to light up.

### ATX Power Switch/Soft-Off Switch (2-pin PWR\_SW)

This connector is for the system power switch. Pressing the power switch turns the system between ON and SLEEP, or ON and SOFT OFF, depending on the BIOS or OS settings. Pressing the power switch for more than 4 seconds when the system is on turns the system off.

### Reset Switch (2-pin RESET)

This connector is for the case-mounted reset switch for rebooting the system without turning off the system power.

This chapter describes the power up sequence and gives information on the BIOS beep codes.

### 3.1 Starting up for the first time

- 1. After making all the connections, replace the system case cover.
- 2. Be sure that all switches are off.
- Connect the power cord to the power connector at the back of the system chassis.
- 4. Connect the power cord to a power outlet that is equipped with a surge protector.
- 5. Turn on the devices in the following order:
  - a. Monitor
  - b. External SCSI devices (starting with the last device on the chain)\*
  - c. System power
    - \* SCSI models only
- 6. After applying power, the power LED on the system front panel case lights up. For ATX power supplies, the system LED lights up when you press the ATX power switch. If your monitor complies with "green" standards or if it has a "power standby" feature, the monitor LED may light up or switch between orange and green after the system LED turns on. The system then runs the power-on tests. While the tests are running, the BIOS beeps (see BIOS beep codes table below) or additional messages appear on the screen. If you do not see anything within 30 seconds from the time you turned on the power, the system may have failed a power-on test. Check the jumper settings and connections or call your retailer for assistance.

7. At power on, hold down <Delete> to enter BIOS Setup. Follow the instructions in Chapter 4.

### 3.2 Powering off the computer

### 3.2.1 Using the OS shut down function

If you are using Windows® 2000 Professional or Windows® 2000 Server:

- 1. Click the **Start** button then click **Shut Down...**
- 2. Make sure that the **Shut down** option button is selected, then click the **OK** button to shut down the computer.
- 3. The power supply should turn off after Windows® shuts down.

If you are using Windows® XP or Windows® Server 2003:

- 1. Click the **Start** button then select **Turn Off Computer.**
- 2. Click the **Turn Off** button to shut down the computer.
- 3. The power supply should turn off after Windows® shuts down.

### 3.2.2 Using the dual function power switch

While the system is ON, pressing the power switch for less than 4 seconds puts the system to sleep mode or to soft-off mode, depending on the BIOS setting. Pressing the power switch for more than 4 seconds lets the system enter the soft-off mode regardless of the BIOS setting. See section "4.5 Power Menu" in Chapter 4.

# Chapter 4

This chapter tells how to change system settings through the BIOS Setup Menus. Detailed descriptions of the BIOS parameters are also provided.

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### 4.1 Managing and updating your BIOS



- The **original BIOS file** for this motherboard is in the support CD.
- Copy the original BIOS to a bootable floppy disk in case you need to restore the BIOS in the future.

### 4.1.1 Creating a bootable floppy disk

1. Do either one of the following to create a bootable floppy disk.

#### **DOS** environment

Insert a 1.44 MB floppy disk into the drive. At the DOS prompt, type: format a: /s, then press the <Enter> key.

#### Windows® XP environment

- a. Insert a new 1.44 MB floppy disk in the floppy disk drive.
- b. From the Windows desktop, click **Start > My Computer**.
- c. In the My Computer window, click the 3 1/2 Floppy icon.
- d. From the Menu bar, click File > Format.
- e. Select "Create an MS-DOS Startup Disk" in the Format Options field, then click Start.
- 2. Copy the original (or the latest) motherboard BIOS to the bootable floppy disk.

### 4.1.2 Updating the BIOS

The Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) can be updated using the AwardBIOS Flash Utility. Follow these instructions to update the BIOS using this utility.

1. Download the latest BIOS file from the ASUS web site. Rename the file to \*.BIN and save it to a floppy disk.



Save only the updated BIOS file in the floppy disk to avoid loading the wrong BIOS file.

- 2. Copy the AwardBIOS Flash Utility (awdflash.exe) from the Software folder of the support CD to the floppy disk with the latest BIOS file.
- 3. Boot the system in DOS mode using the bootable floppy disk you created earlier.
- When the A:> appears, replace the bootable floppy disk with the floppy disk containing the new BIOS file and the Award BIOS Flash Utility.
- 5. At the prompt, type awdflash then press <Enter>. The Award BIOS Flash Utility screen appears.



7. The utility prompts you to save the current BIOS file. Press <Y> to save the current BIOS file to the floppy disk, or <N> to continue.



If you intend to save the current BIOS file, make sure that the floppy disk has enough disk space to save the file. See the next section for details on saving the current BIOS file.

8. The utility verifies the BIOS file in the floppy disk and starts flashing the BIOS file.





Do not turn off or reset the system during the flashing process!

9. The utility displays a **Flashing Complete** message indicating that you have successfully flashed the BIOS file. Press <F1> to restart the system.



### 4.1.3 Saving the current BIOS file

You can use the AwardBIOS Flash Utility to save the current BIOS file. You can load the current BIOS file when the BIOS file gets corrupted during the flashing process.

To save the current BIOS file using the AwardBIOS Flash Utility:

- 1. Follow steps 1 to 6 of the previous section.
- 2. Press <Y> when the utility prompts you to save the current BIOS file. The following screen appears.



3. Type a filename for the current BIOS file in the **Save current BIOS** as field, then press <Enter>.



4. The utility saves the current BIOS file to the floppy disk, then returns to the BIOS flashing process.



### 4.2 BIOS Setup program

This motherboard includes a Flash ROM that you can update using the provided utility described in section "4.1 Managing and updating your BIOS."

Use the BIOS Setup program when you are installing a motherboard, reconfiguring your system, or prompted to "Run Setup". This section explains how to configure your system using this utility.

Even if you are not prompted to use the Setup program, you may want to change the configuration of your computer in the future. For example, you may want to enable the security password feature or make changes to the power management settings. This requires you to reconfigure your system using the BIOS Setup program so that the computer can recognize these changes and record them in the CMOS RAM of the Flash ROM.

The Flash ROM on the motherboard stores the Setup utility. When you start up the computer, the system provides you with the opportunity to run this program. Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST) to enter the Setup utility, otherwise, POST continues with its test routines.


If you wish to enter Setup after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctrl> + <Alt> + <Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You can also restart by turning the system off and then back on. Do this last option only if the first two failed.

The Setup program is designed to make it as easy to use as possible. It is a menu-driven program, which means you can scroll through the various sub-menus and make your selections among the predetermined choices.



Because the BIOS software is constantly being updated, the following BIOS setup screens and descriptions are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.

### 4.2.1 BIOS menu screen



### 4.2.2 Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

Main For changing the basic system configuration settings

**Advanced** For changing the advanced system settings

**Power** For changing the power configuration settings

**Boot** For changing the system boot configuration settings

**Exit** For selecting the exit options and loading default settings

To select the menu bar items, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

### 4.2.3 Navigation keys

At the **bottom** of a menu screen are the navigation keys for that particular menu. Use the navigation keys to select items in the menu and change the settings.



The navigation keys differ from one screen to another.

### 4.2.4 General help

On the right side of the menu screen is a brief description of the selected item.

### 4.2.5 Sub-menu

An item with a sub-menu on any menu screen is distinguished by a solid triangle before the item. To display the sub-menu, select the item and press <Enter>.

### 4.2.6 Scroll bar

A scroll bar appears on the right side of a menu screen when there are items that do not fit on the screen. Press **Up/Down arrow keys** or **PageUp/PageDown keys** to display the other items on the screen.

### 4.2.7 Pop-up window


Select an item in the menu, then press <Enter> to display a pop-up window with the configuration options for that item.

### 4.3 Main menu

When you enter the BIOS Setup program, the Main menu screen appears giving you an overview of the basic system information.



Refer to section "4.2.1 BIOS menu screen" for information on the menu screen items and how to navigate through them.



### System Time (hh:mm:ss)

Sets the system to the time that you specify (usually the current time). The format is hour:minute:second. Valid values for hour, minute, and second are Hour: (00 to 23), Minute: (00 to 59), Second: (00 to 59). Use the <Tab> key to move between the hour, minute, and second fields.

### System Date (mm:dd:yy)

Sets the system to the date that you specify (usually the current date). The format is month:day:year. Valid values for month, day, and year are Month: (1 to 12), Day: (1 to 31), Year: (1999 to 2099). Use the <Tab> key to move between the month, day, and year fields.


### Legacy Diskette A [1.44M, 3.5 in.]

Sets the type of floppy drive installed. Configuration options: [None] [360K, 5.25 in.] [1.2M, 5.25 in.] [720K, 3.5 in.] [1.44M, 3.5 in.] [2.88M, 3.5 in.]

### Base/Extended/Total Memory [xxxK]

The base memory, extended memory, and total memory values are auto-detected. These fields are not user-configurable.

### 4.3.1 Primary IDE Master



### **Auto-Detection [Press Enter]**

Press <Enter> to automatically detect an IDE drive, if the drive is not yet detected. Upon pressing <Enter>, the message "Detecting Hard Drive..." appears as the BIOS attempts to detect the presence of a IDE drive.

### **Primary IDE Master [Auto]**

Select [Auto] to automatically detect an IDE drive. If automatic detection is successful, the setup BIOS automatically fills in the correct values for the remaining fields on this sub-menu.

If automatic detection fails, this may be because the IDE drive is too old or too new. If the drive was already formatted on a previous system, the BIOS may detect incorrect parameters. If no drive is installed or if you are removing a drive and not replacing it, select [None]. Configuration options: [None] [Auto] [Manual]



The IDE drive information items are grayed out when this item is set to [Auto].

### Access Mode [Auto]

Allows selection of the sector addressing mode. The default [Auto] allows automatic detection of an IDE drive. Set this item to [CHS] if the **Primary IDE Master** item is set to [Manual] so you can manually enter the drive values. Configuration options: [CHS] [LBA] [Large] [Auto]

### PIO Mode [Auto]



### **UDMA Mode [Auto]**

When this item is set to [Auto], the UDMA capability allows improved transfer speeds and data integrity for supported IDE drives. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Auto]

### Manually detecting an IDE drive

If you wish to manually enter the drive information, set the Primary IDE Master item to [Manual], and the Access Mode item to [CHS].





Before attempting to manually configure an IDE drive, make sure that you have the correct configuration information supplied by the drive manufacturer. Incorrect settings may cause the system to fail to recognize the installed IDE drive!

To manually enter the number of cylinder, head, precomp, landing zone, and sector per track for the drive, highlight an item, key-in the value that you obtained from the drive documentation, then press <Enter>. Refer to the drive documentation or the drive label for this information.

Shows the data transfer mode if the IDE hard disk drive supports the feature. Otherwise, this item is grayed out and shows the value [None].

#### S.M.A.R.T. Status

Shows the Smart Monitoring, Analysis, and Reporting Technology (S.M.A.R.T.) status if the IDE hard disk drive supports the feature. Otherwise, this item is grayed out and shows the value [None].



After entering the IDE hard disk drive information, use a disk utility, such as FDISK, to partition and format new IDE drives. This is necessary so that you can write or read data from the hard disk. Make sure to set the partition of the Primary IDE hard disk drive to "Active."

Select this option to discard the changes that you made, and restore the previously saved values. When a confirmation appears, type [Y] to discard any changes and load the previously saved values, or [N] to cancel and return to the menu.



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
